


THE HARBOUR SCHOOL NEWS


STEM Activity - How to make a life cycle mobile

With more than 350 careers in the NHS, there's something for everyone


National Careers Week welcomed several visitors to The Harbour School and here is a snapshot of what happened at our campuses.

Healthy Start vitamins and food vouchers If you're more than 10 weeks pregnant or have children under the age of 4 you can get payments via the Healthy Start scheme every four weeks to spend on:

cow's milk

fresh, frozen or tinned fruit and vegetables

infant formula milk

fresh, dried, and tinned pulses

The scheme is fairly easy to access and use - most retailers accept the card as payment and free vitamins are also available.
